## Directions for the Use of Jitsi

All registered participants can access all parts of the conference via a Jitsi conference room. Please use the Chrome browser and enter or click the following URL: <https://meetings.uni-greifswald.de/AskingAndAnswering>

The password will be provided to all participants via email.

Jitsi is not supported by other browsers than Google Chrome. However, it is not necessary to have a Google account in order to use Jitsi. Just download the browser at <https://www.google.com/chrome/> and open above Jitsi link in this browser. You will then be prompted to enter the password.

An alternative way, especially for tablets and smartphones, is the use of the Jitsi App which can be found in the AppStore (or equivalent). When using the app, please take care to enter the URL exactly as it is given above, including the https-part, or else you will probably create a new Jitsi room with you as the only participant.

## How to Share Screen in Jitsi

When opened in the Google Chrome browser you will see three icons at the bottom left, which will come in handy during the conference: The leftmost calls up the chat and lets you send general and personal messages. The second from the left is the screensharing button (see figure 1). The third is the handraising button.

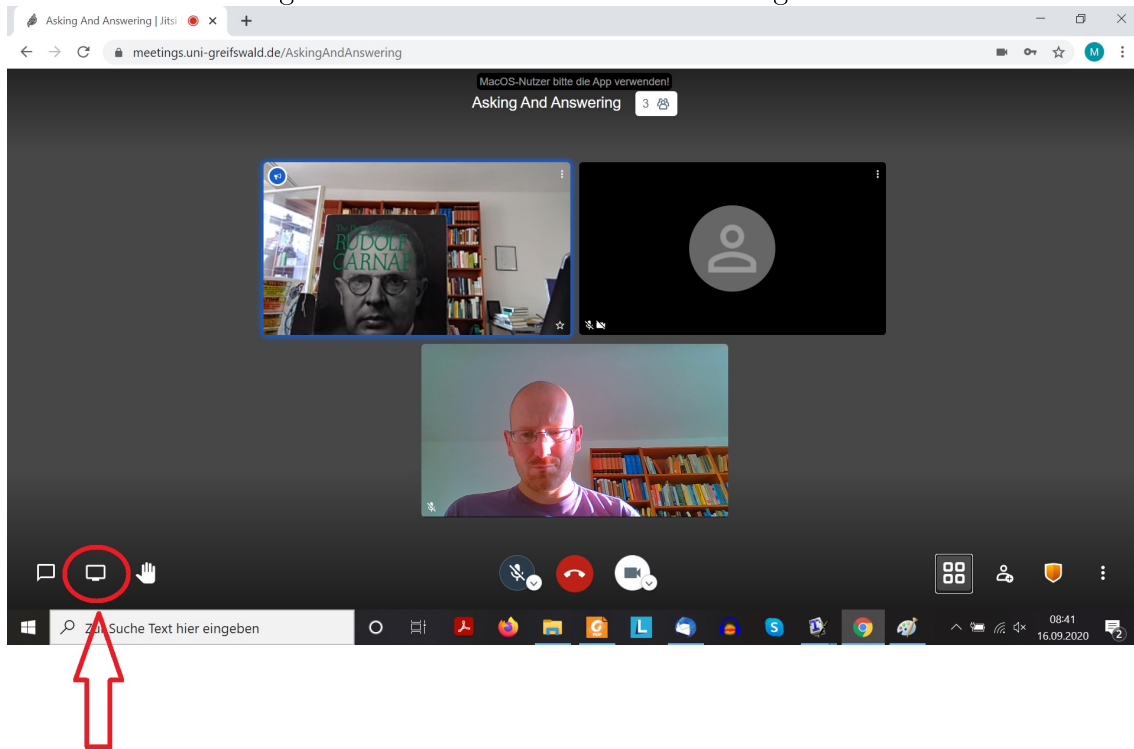


Figure 2: Selection of the window to share.

To share the screen click the screensharing button. A window will pop up. One of the three options offered will be to share an individual window (it is the middle option in figure 2, below). If the window that you want to share does not show up, then it might be that you have minimized it. Maximize the window (Adobe Reader, Powerpoint, etc.), switch back to Jitsi/Chrome, and select the window. The window will be shared now, regardless of what is the active window on your screen. To stop sharing hit the screensharing button in the Jitsi/Chrome window again.
